Match background

In their last UEFA Champions League home game Hapoel Tel-Aviv FC found themselves two goals down inside 36 minutes, eventually succumbing 3-1 to Olympique Lyonnais. They will be determined to make amends in this return fixture with FC Schalke 04.

- The Israeli champions also went down 3-1 in Gelsenkirchen on Matchday 3, Raúl González scoring twice to take his tally in UEFA club competition to 70 goals. It was Hapoel's third successive Group B defeat while Schalke are second in the standings on six points, three adrift of Lyon.

Previous meetings

- That game at the Arena AufSchalke was the first competitive fixture between the clubs and the first time Schalke had faced a side from Israel.

- In last season's UEFA Europa League group stage Hapoel followed a 4-2 away defeat by Hamburger SV with a 1-0 home win. Etey Shechter was on the scoresheet in the away game.

Match background

- Only the third Israeli team to reach the group stage, Hapoel lost their opening two fixtures at SL Benfica, 2-0, and then at home to Lyon.

- The previous two Israeli teams to compete in the UEFA Champions League group stage, Maccabi Haifa FC and Maccabi Tel-Aviv FC, both finished bottom of their group. No team from that country has managed to win a group match in the competition proper in 11 attempts; the last victors were Maccabi Tel-Aviv, who beat AFC Ajax 2-1 on 3 November 2004.

- In the play-off round Hapoel drew 1-1 at home with FC Salzburg after a 3-2 away win. Eli Gutman's side had edged past FK Aktobe 3-2 on aggregate in the third qualifying round, winning 3-1 at home, while in the previous stage they defeated FK Željezničar 6-0 with all but one of the goals coming in Israel.

- Schalke, looking to repeat their achievement in their last UEFA Champions League appearance in 2007/08 when they reached the knockout rounds, went down 1-0 in Lyon on Matchday 1. They bounced back with a 2-0 home win against Benfica.

Team ties

- Shechter's late goal in a UEFA EURO 2012 qualifier at Ramat Gan could not prevent an Israel defeat by Croatia on 9 October. Gil Vermouth also played the full 90 minutes for the home side while Ivan Rakitić appeared as a second-half substitute for the visitors.

- Rakitić and Toto Tamuz came on as substitutes as Croatia beat Israel 1-0 in a UEFA EURO 2008 qualifier at the Maksimir Stadium in Zagreb on 13 October 2007. Ben Sahar and Dedi Ben-Dayan were unused replacements.

- Hans Sarpei was in the Ghana team that beat Nigeria 1-0 in the 2010 African Cup of Nations semi-final. Vincent Enyeama was in goal for the losing side.

- Raúl helped Spain to a 2-0 FIFA World Cup qualifying victory against Israel in October 2000. Walid Badier featured for Israel.

- Felix Magath was coach of the FC Bayern München team that won 1-0 in Tel Aviv against Maccabi Tel-Aviv in the 2004/05 UEFA Champions League group stage. The German side also won 5-1 in Munich.

- Kyriakos Papadopoulos helped Olympiacos FC to a 2-0 Greek Super League win at a Larissa FC side including Salim Toama on 30 August 2009.

- Klaas-Jan Huntelaar made his European debut in SC Heerenveen's 5-0 home win against Maccabi Petach-Tikva FC in the UEFA Cup first round in September 2004.

- Salim Toama made his first start of the campaign as Eli Gutman's side claimed a fourth successive Ligat ha'Al victory.
- Hapoel have kept just one clean sheet in their last 15 UEFA Champions League and league games.
- Douglas da Silva (56) and substitute Toama (90) registered their first league goals of the season as Hapoel came from behind to win 2-1 at Maccabi Petach-Tikva FC on 24 October.
- Toama, who returned to Hapoel this summer after spells at R. Standard de Liège and Larissa FC and also counts Petach-Tikva among his former clubs, had not scored for the club since an almost identical free-kick against Maccabi Tel-Aviv FC in May 2007.
- Two days later Hapoel's League Cup ambitions ended with a 1-0 loss at home to Maccabi Netanya FC – their fourth defeat in five group stage outings. With one match to come, against Maccabi Tel-Aviv on 10 November, Gutman's side are resigned to finishing bottom of the four-team section.
- Hapoel suffered just one reverse en route to the title last season: they lost two in their opening four games this time around, 1-0 at Hapoel Haifa FC, and 4-2 at home to Hapoel Ironi Kiryat Shmona FC.

Injury news

- Avihay Yadin went off with an ankle injury against Hapoel Beer-Sheva.
- Ben-Dayan made his first appearance in three weeks against Maccabi Petach-Tikva following a knee injury.
- Shechter will sit out Matchday 4 after tearing his right hamstring at Maccabi Petach-Tikva.
- Romain Rocchi has been ruled out until the new year after undergoing an operation on stomach and groin problems.
- Mahran Lala could be out for the season after undergoing surgery on ruptured knee ligaments suffered in a 3-2 League Cup win against Maccabi Tel-Aviv on 14 August.

- Mario Gavranović made his first appearance of the season for Schalke after injuries to Lukas Schmitz and Schmitz's half-time replacement, Joel Matip.
- Schalke have lost eight of their 16 fixtures in all competitions this term, the same as in the whole of 2009/10.
- Schalke and VfL Borussia Mönchengladbach are the only Bundesliga sides yet to win at home in the league this term.
- Schalke advanced to the last 16 of the German Cup on 26 October, José Manuel Jurado scoring the only goal at FSV Frankfurt. They will now travel to another second-tier side, FC Augsburg, on 21/22 December.

- It was Magath's side's second trip to Frankfurt in three days having drawn 0-0 with Eintracht Frankfurt on 23 October – their 100th goalless draw in the Bundesliga but first this season.
- Klaas-Jan Huntelaar has scored 14 goals in 16 games for club and country this season.
- Schalke were bottom of the Bundesliga after losing their opening four league games, their worst ever start to a top-flight campaign. The last time they started with even two league losses, in 1987/88 – when they eventually lost their first three matches – they were relegated.

Injury news

- Schmitz suffered a hip problem on Saturday and has been ruled out of the trip to Israel. His half-time replacement, Matip, also went off with injury.
- Junmin Hao will also sit out Matchday 4 having undergone an appendectomy on 29 October.
- Jermaine Jones, who missed the whole of last season with a tibia injury, suffered an ankle problem at FSV and missed the Leverkusen loss.
- Tim Hoogland has not featured this term due to a knee problem and pancreatitis, but has returned to training.
- Levan Kenia has not played since 25 October 2009 due to an ankle problem.
- Christian Pander remains sidelined with muscular problems that forced him to miss all of last season.

Miscellaneous

- Jones, who played three friendly internationals for Germany in 2008 and 2009, made his debut for the United States against Poland on 9 October.

Coaching career: Maccabi Kiryat Bialik FC, Beitar Haifa FC, Maccabi Tirat Carmel FC, Maccabi Tamra FC, Hapoel Zafirim Holon FC, Maccabi Herzliya FC, Hapoel Beit Sha'an FC, Hapoel Beer-Sheva FC (twice), Hapoel Haifa FC (twice), Beitar Jerusalem FC, Hapoel Petach-Tikva FC, Enosis Neon Paralimni FC, Maccabi Netanya FC, AEL Limassol FC, Hapoel Tel-Aviv FC

- Had a low-key career as a midfielder before hanging up his boots at 28, moving into coaching with fifth division Maccabi Kiryat Bialik FC. Completed a sports science degree and became a teacher as well as coaching in local divisions after national service as a naval officer.
- Gutman's first taste of top-flight football came in 1990 when he spent two years as assistant coach at Maccabi Haifa. Won his first major honour in 1997, leading Hapoel Beer-Sheva to Israeli State Cup success.
- Returned to boyhood club Hapoel Haifa in 1997, clinching a league championship two years later.
- Indifferent stints at Beitar Jerusalem and Hapoel Petach-Tikva preceded successful spells with Cypriot sides Paralimni and AEL. Responded to bottom-of-the-table Hapoel Tel-Aviv's rescue call in 2007, steering the club to seventh position and the State Cup final.
- A dramatic climax to 2009/10 brought the league and cup double in a three-day period. At the start of the next season, Hapoel emerged through three qualifying rounds to reach the UEFA Champions League group stage for the first time.

FC Schalke 04: Felix Magath

Date of birth: 26 July 1953

Nationality: German

Playing career: 1. FC Saarbrücken, Hamburger SV

Coaching career: Hamburger SV, 1. FC Nürnberg, Werder Bremen, Eintracht Frankfurt, VfB Stuttgart, FC Bayern München, VfL Wolfsburg, FC Schalke 04

- An elegant creative midfielder, Felix Magath's most successful coaching assignment to date came at Bayern where he won the double in 2005 and 2006, more title glory coming at Wolfsburg in 2009.
- The son of a Puerto Rican soldier in the US Army and a German mother, Magath won 43 caps for West Germany encompassing victory in the 1980 UEFA European Championship and the 1982 and 1986 FIFA World Cups, both of which brought runners-up medals. Magath made more than 300 Bundesliga appearances during ten years at Hamburg, getting the only goal of the 1983 European Champion Clubs' Cup final against Juventus.
- His coaching career also started at Hamburg, Magath moving onto Nürnberg, Bremen, Eintracht and Stuttgart, where he was voted coach of the year in 2002/03. He switched to Bayern in 2004 and won the title at the first attempt having set a Bundesliga record of 15 successive wins. The German Cup was also acquired and Magath repeated the double triumph the next season.
- Left Munich in January 2007, joining Wolfsburg that summer and guiding the club to the first league title in their history two years later.
- Magath decided against taking the club into the UEFA Champions League, instead switching to Schalke. He led the Gelsenkirchen outfit to second place behind Bayern in his first season.

- Frank De Bleeckere is carrying on a family tradition which has endured for more than four decades. De Bleeckere's grandfather was a referee in Belgium in the 1950s and 1960s, and his father René a top-flight match official 20 years ago.

- A PR manager born in Oudenaarde, De Bleeckere started refereeing in 1984, oversaw his first top-flight match in 1995 and received his FIFA badge in 1998. The same year he officiated at the UEFA European Under-16 Championship, and quickly graduated to UEFA Champions League and UEFA Cup duties.

- He sandwiched UEFA EURO 2004, where he was one of four specialist fourth officials, with appearances at the 2003 FIFA U-20 World Cup and 2005 FIFA U-17 World Cup, where he refereed the final between Mexico and Brazil. De Bleeckere had earlier overseen a showpiece closer to home, the 2005 Belgian Cup final.

- At the 2006 FIFA World Cup De Bleeckere took charge of four matches and he was also the referee for three games at UEFA EURO 2008.

- Has continued to be a regular in the UEFA Champions League and oversaw the 2007/08 UEFA Cup semi-final second leg between ACF Fiorentina and Rangers FC. Also took charge of FC Barcelona's defeat of FC Shakhtar Donetsk in the 2009 UEFA Super Cup and three games at the 2010 World Cup.

Competition facts

• UEFA Champions League: Group stage milestones

Holders FC Internazionale Milano are looking to avoid becoming the first defending champions to fail to get through a group stage since the UEFA Champions League began. (This record, like the others, includes the seasons between 1999/2000 and 2002/03 that featured a second group stage).

In 1992/93, FC Barcelona were the reigning European Champion Clubs' Cup holders and were beaten 4-3 on aggregate in the second round by PFC CSKA Moskva.

S.S. Lazio goalkeeper Marco Ballotta became the oldest player to compete in the UEFA Champions League in 2007/08 when he featured against Olympiacos FC on Matchday 1 at the age of 43 years and 168 days. The record was previously held by Alessandro Costacurta, the AC Milan defender who played against AEK Athens FC in 2006/07 at the age of 40 years and 211 days. Ballotta was aged 43 years 252 days when he featured against Real Madrid CF on Matchday 6.

Javier Zanetti is the oldest player to score in the competition, aged 37 years and 72 days, having found the net for FC Internazionale Milano in their 4-3 defeat of Tottenham Hotspur FC on 20 October 2010.

Celestine Babayaro is the youngest player to have appeared in the UEFA Champions League. He was 16 years and 87 days when he started for RSC Anderlecht against FC Steaua Bucureşti on 23 November 1994. He was then sent off in the 37th minute.

Barcelona and Manchester United have both finished as group winners on 11 occasions, one more than Milan and Real Madrid.

Four teams have recorded six successive victories in a UEFA Champions League group stage: Milan (1992/93), Paris Saint-Germain FC (1994/95), FC Spartak Moskva (1995/96) and Barcelona (2002/03, first group stage).

Ten teams have gone through a UEFA Champions League group stage without picking up a single point, including Maccabi Haifa FC and Debreceni VSC in 2009/10. The other eight are: FC Dynamo Kyiv (2007/08), PFC Levski Sofia (2006/07), SK Rapid Wien (2005/06), RSC Anderlecht (2004/05), FC Spartak Moskva and Bayer 04 Leverkusen (2002/03, first and second group stage respectively), Fenerbahçe SK (2001/02, first group stage) and 1. FC Košice (1997/98).

Manchester United scored 20 goals in the 1998/99 group stage, more than any other side has managed. Barcelona scored 19 times in the 1999/2000 first group stage.

Debrecen conceded 19 goals in their six outings in 2009/10, equalling the record let in during a group stage set by Dynamo Kyiv (2007/08) and Ferencvárosi TC in 1995/96.

No team has ever gone through a UEFA Champions League group stage without conceding a goal. Milan (1992/93), AFC Ajax (1995/96), Juventus (1996/97 and 2004/05), Chelsea FC (2005/06), Liverpool FC (2005/06) and Villarreal CF (2005/06) all let in just one.

Before their 3-1 win against Sporting Clube de Portugal on Matchday 6 of the 2006/07 campaign, FC Spartak Moskva went 22 games without a victory in the competition, surpassing the unwanted record set by AEK Athens FC on Matchday 3 of the same campaign.

The lowest total for a team qualifying from the group stage is seven points. The first to do it, since three points for a win was introduced in 1995/96, were Legia Warszawa that same season before FC Dynamo Kyiv and Bayer Leverkusen managed it in 1999/2000 and Liverpool in 2001/02. FC Lokomotiv Moskva and eventual finalists Juventus both progressed with seven points in 2002/03, a feat achieved by Rangers FC and Werder Bremen in 2005/06.
